Meet Kurt Vonnegut

Kurt Vonnegut, 1922-2007, was famous during his lifetime for humorous and disturbing satirical and science fiction novels such as *Slaughterhouse-5* (based on his firsthand experiences during WWII) and *Breakfast of Champions*, but was also well-known for his environmental activism and strong criticism of the American political system. Vonnegut, a UU, humanist, and atheist, was critical of religious faith and of Christianity in particular. A typical expression of his religious viewpoint: "How on earth can religious people believe in so much arbitrary, clearly invented balderdash? The acceptance of a creed, any creed, entitles the acceptor to membership in the sort of artificial extended family we call a congregation. It is a way to fight loneliness. Any time I see a person fleeing from reason into religion I think to myself, there goes a person who simply cannot stand being so goddamned lonely anymore." (Address to a Unitarian congregation, Cambridge, Massachusetts, January 27, 1980, quoted in *2000 Years of Disbelief, Famous People with the Courage to Doubt*, by James A. Haught.) A recurrent theme in his writing was the misuse of science for evil ends. Originally from Indianapolis, Vonnegut attended Cornell University and Carnegie Institute of Technology, then enlisted in the Army during WWII. He began his career writing articles and short stories for popular magazines, then became well-established as one of the most popular and influential American novelists of the later 20th century. Other Vonnegut quotes: "Say what you will about the sweet miracle of unquestioning faith. I consider the capacity for it terrifying." "I am an atheist (or at best a Unitarian who winds up in church quite a lot).
